Overview

In this introductory course in Human Geography, concepts of space, place, landscape, region, and scale provide key lenses for viewing the processes that have shaped – and are continually re-shaping – the planet, highlighting themes of globalization, urbanization, and environmental change. The class offers a broad regional survey of the inhabited earth, exploring the world as a geographically differentiated, but highly integrated, space of human settlement, economy, politics, and cultural life. By emphasizing local case studies alongside the study of global interconnections, we attempt to understand both the accelerating pace of globalization *and* the persistence of place and locality amid changing regional and global contexts.

The course also examines a number of contemporary regional issues, such as the movement of refugees and the borders of 'Fortress Europe'; changing land rights in West Africa; deforestation in South America; and migration and urbanization in China, to name a few. In doing so, World Regional Geography promotes global geographical literacy – the idea that, because we live globally, we require a planetary sense of *where things are* and *how things work* – while providing key concepts and perspectives for making sense of geographical difference in a changing world.

If you look at the topics in the provisional schedule below, you will find a dizzying geographical range of topics, from Europe to post-Soviet Russia to the Middle East, Sub-Saharan Africa, Asia, and the Americas. How is possible for us to cover so much ground in one semester?



With help from a number of more or less knowledgeable guides, including the characters from the 1956 film version of *Around the World in Eighty Days*, pictured here ←, who memorably make the planetary journey in slightly less time. Following the heroes of this onetime Hollywood blockbuster on their circumnavigation provides a rough itinerary for our "travels" from region to region in this course, while also ensuring that we don't take ourselves too seriously.

Alongside regular course lectures, GEOG 120 will also focus on a range of cinematic and visual culture materials – including slideshows and documentary video – to help engage with cultural life in distant settings, and to provide some sense of the everyday landscapes and changing experiences of places and regions. Despite the relatively large size of GEOG 120, we will also attempt to keep things lively through a variety of in-class discussion and small group participation & response" exercises as well as mapping projects designed to encourage critical thinking and active learning.
